A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Around the beginning of the 20th century, many not-so-good changes were happening in Missouri that some Missouri sportsmen realized would be detrimental to wildlife and all natural resources in the state, over harvesting of wildlife, the excessive cutting of Missouri's forest and poor farming practices. In 1935, the urgent need for protections of our state's natural resources inspired concerned citizens to come together. Out of this group, our organization became the Conservation Federation of Missouri we know today.

Fortunately for us, some real positive changes to preserving Missouri's natural resources came out of that group of concerned citizens. More Missourians began to recognize the relationship among forests, parks, soil, water and their effect on wildlife. In 1976 with the help of the Federation, Missouri voters designated 1/8th cent of sales tax to be appropriated for the Missouri Department of Conservation. Again in 1984, Missouri voters passed a 1/10th cent sales tax for state parks and soil conservation administered by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. These are just a few examples of how a group of concerned citizens made real and positive change for Missouri conservation.

Positive changes continued to happen in 2018. CFM added three

new staff members to complete our team. Staff worked hard at increasing attendance at all of our events that include: Annual Convention, Explorer the Outdoors and the Sporting Clay shoots. These events not only provided opportunities in fundraising but provided a platform to help raise our awareness as "The Voice for Missouri Outdoors".

This past year we awarded \$10,125 to 11 affiliated organizations through the inaugural David Risberg Memorial Grants. These funds provided our affiliates financial support for conservation projects. By the end of the year, our diverse group of affiliates expanded to more than 100 organizations. We are forever grateful for these partnerships and look forward to growing them in the years ahead.

As we move forward in 2019, we will continue with our mission to advocate, educate and partner with like-minded individuals, businesses and organizations across our state to preserve our outdoor heritage.



2018 HIGHLIGHTS

This year brought many exciting changes for CFM. Members enjoyed new events, as well as our favorite traditional gatherings. CFM stood up for conservation at the Capitol time and time again. All the while, we carried on successful programs and progressed our mission to preserve our state's natural resources.

LILLEYS' LANDING MEDIA CAMP

CFM held our 4th media event February 4-7th at Lilleys' Landing Resort & Marina on Lake Taneycomo in Branson. There were 20 media members in attendance that left the event with conservation and natural resources story ideas for newspapers, magazines, radio and television.



The 4th Annual Conservation Day at the Capitol was held March 27. The event brought conservationists from all over Missouri together at the Capitol for day of promoting, supporting, and educating the public about our natural resources.

Citizens and legislators alike toured the booths and learned about the diverse outdoor passions of Missourians. CFM presented our legislator of the year award to Representative Tommie Pierson, Jr. and Senator Mike Kehoe.

EXPLORE THE OUTDOORS








SPRINGFIELD





2018 PROGRAM UPDATES

SHARE THE HARVEST



In the 2017/2018 deer season, CFM reimbursed the processors for 5,969 donated whole deer. This provided over 300,000 pounds of venison to Missouri's food pantries. This amazing support exemplifies outdoorsmen's dedication to helping those in need. Over the years, funding in excess of four million dollars has come from numerous businesses, organizations and agencies. Consistent funding and logistic support from the Missouri Department of Conservation make the program possible. Our great partnership is able to both help the management of our Missouri wild deer heard and provide nutritious food to those in need.

MISSOURI COLLEGIATE CONSERVATION ALLIANCE

CFM continues to expand the Missouri Collegiate Conservation Alliance (MCCA). The goal of MCCA is to unite, educate, and engage collegeaged students in conservation.

We continue to work together to provide students with the information to become knowledgeable about and engaged in efforts on behalf of conservation in Missouri through e-newsletters, social media, a new website and toolkits created with grant funding from the Mysun Charitable Foundation.

CFM continues to encourage students to join MCCA and spread the word to their peers. We will continue to reach out to students at colleges and universities across the state to grow MCCA membership.



CONSERVATION LEADERSHIP CORPS



The Conservation Leadership Corps (CLC) is an exceptional opportunity for students to increase knowledge of conservation while developing leadership skills. CLC engages students in conservation policies. Students are guided through the process of researching topics and writing resolutions on current issues in conservation.

Students develop leadership and communication skills as they engage in learning about natural resources and conservation in Missouri. These passionate students are interested in making a difference and becoming future conservation leaders.

Students attended the 2018 Annual Convention and the Fall Workshop at Lake of the Ozarks State Park. Both events allow students to learn about current conservation issues and draft resolutions. These events allow time for leadership sessions and networking opportunities. In 2018, 40 students participated in the program. We had our highest attendance yet at the Fall Workshop.

In addition, the students were involved in different volunteer activities around the state. An important part of being an advocate for conservation is to be engaged. The CLC Stream Team floated the Niangua River to pick up trash. Students also worked on the outdoor classroom and trails at Prairie Fork Conservation Area and helped with many other CFM regional events. These dedicated students are the future of conservation.




